NOTES FOR APPLICANTS

1. Applications need to be targeted towards EAAFP key species (link) or habitats, regions, or emerging threats or other specified Partnership objectives. All applications should demonstrate how the project will contribute to the implementation of the [EAAFP Strategic Plan 2019-2028](#).
2. The maximum amount annually provided by the Small Grants Fund to an applicant or for a specific project is \$5,000 (USD). If the project budget exceeds this amount, then the supporting funds and funders need to be identified in the Application.
3. Funds are limited so not all applications may be funded.
4. Applications with in-kind contributions and/or additional matching financial are preferred.
5. Grants are awarded on the strict understanding that funds will be exempt from institutional administration charges (unless Partner government law so requires).
6. Conference attendance will be supported to a maximum of \$1,000 (USD) and is only for Task Force or Working Group members delivering their own work as a presentation, paper or poster. Given the ongoing COVID-19 situation, if the conference or event is held virtually, the grant will cover only any registration fee or other logistic costs for virtual attendance
7. Applications must be reviewed by the relevant EAAFP Working Group (WG) or Task Force (TF) Chair or Coordinator, who will provide a statement of the relative merit of the Application against the assessment criteria, prior to submission. Prior to submission of the Application, it must have been provided to the relevant EAAFP WG or TF Chair or Coordinator for review. The relevant EAAFP WG or TF Chair or Coordinator will provide a statement of the relative merit of the Application against the assessment criteria and may provide suggestions on how the proposal could be strengthened. If you are unsure about which WG or TF to contact, please email the Secretariat for advice.
8. EAAFP Working Groups and Task Forces are eligible for funding to go towards meetings, research, monitoring, site management, training and CEPA events and materials.
9. Students, with the support of the relevant Working Group or Task Force, are only eligible for funding toward studies being undertaken at a research institution or travel to a conference to present original research.
10. Lead investigators are responsible for obtaining all necessary permits from government authorities, indigenous communities, ethics committees etc., to undertake approved research or monitoring studies.
11. Project completion is required within 18 months of the close of the Application period.
12. Successful applicants will be required to provide a short write up of their project outcomes for the EAAFP newsletter and website and to report to the relevant Working Group or Task Force. They are also strongly encouraged to publish their results in peer-reviewed journals.

Call for proposal opens on 4 January. Applications close at 5pm (Seoul Time) on 5 February annually. Announcements of funding will be made by 3 March 2021.

A follow-up application process may be available 6 months later should funds remain.



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Guidance for Applicants

1. Project Assessment Criteria

- 2.1 The contribution the project is anticipated to make to the Key Result Areas (KRAs) listed in the EAAFP Strategic Plan 2019-2028.
- 2.2 Project proposals need to be aligned with priority Single Species Action Plans or overall Working Group and Task Force objectives. Applications are encouraged to contact the relevant Working Group and Task Force Chair or Coordinator to brief them on the Project Proposal. Please contact the EAAFP Programme Officer if additional information is needed (programme@eaaflyway.net).
- 2.3 The justification for the grant funds requested relative to the overall budget of the project.
- 2.4 Project funding is leveraging in-kind contributions and other matching financial support.
- 2.5 The track record of the lead investigator and the likelihood of the project achieving its objectives.

2. Project Assessment Process (for information)

- 3.1 Following initial Secretariat and WG/TF screening and review, the Technical Sub-Committee (TsC) will select at least 1 reviewer per 5 applications (e.g. 4 reviewers for 20 applications). Reviewers should be TsC members or other persons with appropriate expertise and a flyway-wide perspective. Considerations for reviewer selection will include geographic and technical expertise diversity. A lead reviewer will be identified to coordinate the process for each Application.
- 3.2 Reviews should ensure calibration on the ranking definitions and scoring criteria prior to beginning reviews.
- 3.3 Ensure that each Application is reviewed by a minimum of 2 reviewers, with an offset system so pairs of reviewers are rotated in different combinations (for example, with 20 applications, Reviewer A gets applications 1-10, B gets 6-15, C gets 11-20, D gets 16-5). Reviews are encouraged to review as many additional projects as possible.
- 3.4 Reviewers are to recuse themselves from reviewing any application where there is a conflict of interest. These applications will be assigned to another reviewer.
- 3.5 Conduct independent reviews, including reading the Application, scoring, ranking, and notes. Submit reviews to lead reviewer for compilation in a table. Note that all applications should be read prior to scoring to increase perspective. Submit to the lead reviewer, who will share tallied results back with the other reviewers.
- 3.6 Discuss the merits of all applications as a group.
- 3.7 Provide for an opportunity to reach out to applicants with questions, recommendation, or requests for more information. Communicate with the WG/TF Chairs/Coordinators if necessary.
- 3.8 Strive for consensus on overall applications ranking and recommendations on funding.
- 3.9 If there are numerous projects that are scored/ranked closely near the “funding line”, then all reviewers should review those projects prior to a final recommendation.
- 3.10 The lead reviewer will compile and deliver the final recommendations for funding to the Secretariat.
- 3.11 Review Team and the Secretariat should examine the process and recommend changes for the next cycle.

Long term conservation of Baer's Pochard (*Aythya baeri*) and migratory waterbird species in Pyu Lake, Paleik Inn and Banaw Inn in Mandalay Region, Myanmar.

- 1. Objectives:** To strengthen the population of Baer's Pochard at Paleik Inn, Pyu Lake and Banaw Inn in Mandalay region, central Myanmar, and improve management of these sites for all migratory waterbirds. To this end we propose to:
1. Continue monitoring of the wintering population, including numbers, distribution and habitat use
 2. Assess the scale of illegal hunting of Baer's Pochard and other migratory waterbird species at Paleik Inn, Pyu Lake and other nearby wetlands
 3. Raise awareness of the threat to waterbirds from illegal hunting and existing laws relating to this through standing sign boards
 4. Undertake enforcement patrols against illegal hunting at Pyu lake, Paleik Inn and Banaw Inn in November
 5. Develop a national action plan for Baer's Pochard in partnership with the Mandalay Regional Wetland Conservation Committee

- 2. Background:** Our conservation work on the Critically Endangered Baer's Pochard will be carried out at two wetlands recognised for their global significance for the species on the Ayeyarwaddy floodplains of Myanmar, specifically at the Pyu and Paleik lakes in Sint Kaing Township. Both wetlands are located in the country's densely populated and cultivated Mandalay Region, which lies on the mid-floodplain of the biologically diverse Ayeyarwaddy, also one of Asia's last, large undammed rivers. Both lakes contain extensive areas of seasonally inundated and floating vegetation, and supports a very rich biodiversity. Pyu and Paleik lakes are used by large congregations of migratory birds (e.g. wildfowl), including the highly threatened Baer's Pochard. Our surveys have found more than 12 Baer's Pochard at Pyu Lake alone in 2016, which forms 2.4% of the species' world population. Large areas of the countryside around both lakes, and across the wider Ayeyarwaddy floodplains in Mandalay are now heavily cultivated with crops, and encroach on the remaining areas of undisturbed wetlands. Unsustainable agricultural activities such as the heavy usage of water from the lakes to irrigate surrounding areas of cultivation, and water pollution further threatens the pochard's wetland habitats.

Although Myanmar is a known range state for Baer's Pochard with as many as seven Key Biodiversity Areas (KBAs) listed for the species, the discovery of a globally significant congregation of at least 12 Baer's Pochard at Pyu and Paleik Lakes (1% of the global population: 5 individuals) re-confirmed the conservation value and importance of Myanmar's dry zone wetlands as critical wintering sites for the species (Wang et al. 2012; Aung et al. 2016). Both wetlands also meet broader Ramsar criteria for recognition as wetlands of international importance. To deliver high quality conservation for the Baer's Pochard with the local community in mind, BANCA established the Shwe Kan Thayar Nature Conservation Association (SKNCA) with local people living around Pyu Lake to drive community-based conservation of Baer's Pochard, including addressing illegal hunting of waterbirds and unsustainable use of wetlands. Since its formation, the association has worked towards the establishment of a Mandalay Region Wetland Committee to enable and promote cross-sectoral collaboration to conserve the Baer's Pochard and its wetland habitat, with high level political support.

Migratory waterbird species, possibly including Baer's Pochard, are hunted annually at Paleik Inn and Banaw Lakes by using poison bait and shooting (BANCA unpublished report, 2019-2020) SKNCA informed officially to Forest Department and BANCA about the bird hunting using poison bait with recorded pictures in January 2021. Besides, the local villagers said they heard gunshots in Banaw wetland near Pyu Lake in December 2020. The hunting season is extremely long, starting during the wintering season. Furthermore, wetland drought, decreasing water levels and wetland degradation due to climate change have become more serious in recent years. Large areas of the countryside around both lakes, and across the wider Ayeyarwaddy floodplains in Mandalay, are now heavily cultivated with crops and encroach on the remaining areas of undisturbed wetlands. Unsustainable agricultural activities, such as the heavy usage of water from the lakes to irrigate surrounding areas of cultivation and water pollution, further threaten the pochard's wetland habitats.

Forest Department has been regularly doing patrolling at the area of Pyu Lake, Paleik Inn and Banaw Inn with local based organization such as SKNCA and Paleik Bird lover Association supported by BANCA. There are very limited fund t do patrolling regularly in freshwater wetlands in central Myanmar by Forest Department.

There are no wetland management systems or species conservation plans in the central Myanmar dry zone areas. International support was provided for conservation of coastal wetlands in northern, eastern, western and southern Myanmar. This project (EAAFP) is right time to support Baer's Pochard and other freshwater migratory waterbird species.

BANCA, as lead applicant, has extensive experience in biodiversity assessments, awareness, education and community based conservation and Mandalay Regional Wetland Conservation Committee and Paleik Lover Association and Shwe Kan Thayar Nature Conservation Association as partner can provide support for the wise use of wetlands, in particular for sustainable fisheries and agriculture interventions.

3. Project plan, timeline and methods:

Project Plan: To develop national action plan of Baer's Pochard with all stakeholders and this plan can be delivered through EAAFP's Baer's Pochard Taskforce as well as Forest Department, focal government. Doing monitoring on population, distribution and situation habitat and threats mainly for illegal hunting regularly will be conducted and to be strengthen on law enforcement, joint patrolling and standing signboard mainly for the awareness of law enforcement to be understand in local communities very well.

Timeline:

- Monitoring on the population, distribution, habitat and threat mainly for illegal hunting of Baer's Pochard and migratory waterbird species in Paleik Inn, Pyu Lake and other wetlands near Paleik Inn in November – January 2022.
- Awareness of law enforcement in public through standing sign boards and joint patrolling in Pyu lake, Paleik Inn and Banaw Inn in November – December 2021.
- Developing single species action plan of Baer's Pochard by participation of all stakeholder led by Mandalay Regional Wetland Conservation Committee. January-February 2022

4. Likely benefit to the conservation of migratory waterbirds and their habitat / or key research outputs:

This project for the conservation of Baer's Pochard and other migratory waterbird species will contribute to the the following EAAFP Key Result Areas.

KRA 3.1 Monitoring is essential for tracking conservation status and the effectiveness of site protection, and needs to be undertaken in coordination with the AWC and planned flyway-wide survey of Baer's Pochard in January 2022. The core count methodology for Baer's Pochard and migratory waterbirds and their habitat will help to strengthen the nationally coordinated waterbird monitoring programme.

KRA 5.1 Actively collaborating with local government and local communities to develop participatory approaches to awareness and law enforcement for illegal hunting of Baer's Pochard and other migratory waterbird species. This will help to reduce the problem next winter and start to better protect threatened and protected populations under national legislation.

KRA 5.2 A national species action plan for Baer's Pochard would help to secure greater support from local stakeholders and government because it can relate better to national policy drivers than the current International Single Species Action Plan (ISSAP). This action plan can also help in developing Regional Action Plans for geographical regions as well as national wetland action plan in central Myanmar.

KRA 5.4 Collaborating with local government partners to reduce illegal hunting through joint patrolling in Pyu, Paleik and Banaw Inn. It will support the mechanisms in place to reduce illegal bird killing and hunting of migratory waterbirds

This does not directly support the implementation of any ISSAP actions, but will facilitate the implementation of all relevant ISSAP actions in Myanmar.

Explain the part of your project for which you are seeking funds in this Application:</p>	<p>In central Myanmar, freshwater wetlands in Mandalay Region are among the most threatened of Myanmar's ecosystem. Wetlands form important sources of community livelihoods and support migratory waterbird species. But there is no protection system for wetlands in central Myanmar. Mandalay region is the main point for illegal wildlife trade as per assessment of illegal bird hunting (BANCA, BirdLife International, WWF -2019-2020). Others areas such as Wildlife Sanctuary (Protected Areas) have the patrolling and prevention by Government, less numbers of taking and hunting on wildlife can be found. During the period of covid-19, bird hunting was increasing due to weak of law enforcement during the covid-19 outbreak especially in wintering season (Oct-March). The project will be mainstream species conservation into national species conservation planning for long term in freshwater wetlands for central Myanmar, Mandalay Region. Law enforcement in these areas is very important and still lacking for supporting of joint patrolling by Forest Department and community-based organization. Which is why, we are seeking funds in this application.</p>

In early 2016, BANCA conducted an extensive survey at 25 inland lakes in central Myanmar (Ayeyarwaddy River Basin) including eight Key Biodiversity Area (KBAs). It found some sites with potential as important wintering grounds for Baer's Pochard, particularly at the Pyu Lake, where at least 12 Baer's Pochards were observed, and Paleik Lake near Mandalay City where 2 Baer's Pochard were observed with over 5,000 other waterbirds in late January 2016. This project was funded by the Wildfowl & Wetlands Trust (WWT) and Conservation Leadership programme (CLP) in 2016 and 2017.

At Pyu Lake, to conserve the Baer's Pochard and its wetland habitat under a unique, ground-up, community-based model, BANCA has established the 'Shwe Kanthayar' Nature Conservation Association, (SKNCA) in 2017. The group consists mainly of local people living around the lake and works to drive community-based conservation efforts, including efforts to address illegal hunting of waterbirds, and wider problems associated with the unsustainable use of wetlands. In 2018, awareness raising of Baer's Pochard and wetland conservation was undertaken in villages and schools at Pyu Lake and Paleik Inn. This project was funded by Wildlife Conservation Society (Myanmar programme) in 2017 and 2018.

In early 2019, regular annually count of Baer's Pochard and migratory waterbird species in inland freshwater wetlands of central Myanmar was conducted and this project is supported by Minnesota Zoo Fund. In this project, abundance and distribution of Baer's Pochard at Key wetland areas, assessed the threats facing Baer's Pochard and other migratory waterbirds at these locations and developed conservation recommendation for Baer's Pochard conservation in central Myanmar. BANCA also conducted illegal bird killing survey and illegal bird trade in Mon State, Rakhine State and Mandalay Region (key wetlands area of Baer's Pochard in central Myanmar) in 2019 and 2020 supporting BirdLife International (Asia Region) and World Wildlife Fund (WWF) Hong Kong.

2019 BANCA facilitated the establishment of a cross-sectoral Mandalay Regional Wetland Committee. The committee is chaired by Minister of Forest Department and secretaries by the Director of Forest Department and relevant government departments, Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS), BANCA and IUCN are committee members. This committee focuses on sustainable management and long-term conservation and wise use of wetlands in central Myanmar. It acts as a platform to promote cross-sectoral and multi-stakeholder collaboration to conserve the region's fast vanishing freshwater wetlands, with high level political support.

In 2020, BANCA submitted Ramsar Information Sheets for the Paleik Inn and Pyu Lake in central Myanmar to focal government, Forest Department. In central Myanmar, there are no designation of Important wetland protection as well as freshwater wetland management system.

Equipment: Two devices or one devices will be purchased and will support patrolling team. Currnently, patrolling in welands in central Myamar is very poor and lack of devices in patrolling.

Consumable: Three person of survey team will do population and wetland services for 7 days and they would use for daily substances allowances 15 USD per person. In patrolling team, four people will do 3 days in Pyu Lake, Paleik Inn and Banaw Inn for 4 times. The team would use the daily subsistence allowance for 15 USD per person for 7 days in survey and 12 days in pratrolling in wetlands.

Travel and accommodation: In transportation, car will be hired for 15 days for population survey and 13 days for education awareness.

Computing & clerical: The cost will be used in three standing prohibition signboard (for illegal bird hunting) in Pyu Lake, Paleik Inn and Banaw Inn.

Other: One Meeting for preparing action plan of Baer's Pochard with relevant government stakeholder and local villagers.

BANCA will contribute office place, office stationaries, staff times, internet access as in kind in this project.
