The Nature Conservation Society–Myanmar (NCS) celebrated the second World Migratory Bird Day (WMBD) event for 2025 across two villages in Kun Chan Kone Township, Yangon Region, and four villages in Daedaye Township, Ayeyarwady Region, with support from the East Asian–Australasian Flyway Partnership (EAAF).

On November 5, 2025, the NCS-Myanmar team organized the first event at Se Ein Tan Village, where 56 students and 4 teachers from the Basic Education Primary School participated. On November 6, the celebration continued at Let Khoke Kone Village, involving 78 students and 5 teachers from the Basic Education High School where two members of Worldview International Foundation also joined the event and shared the knowledge about the important of Mangrove restoration for climate, wetland ecosystems, and community. On November 7, the team crossed the Toe River to the Ayeyarwady Region. The morning session was held at Sar Kyin Basic Education Post Primary School with 153 students and 3 teachers, followed by an afternoon session at Toe Village's Basic Education High School, attended by 130 students and 4 teachers. The final day, November 8, began with a morning event at Khun Hnit Ein Tan Village's Basic Education Primary School (33 students and 2 teachers) and concluded in the afternoon at Taw Paung Sein Village's Basic Education Post Middle School, where 130 students and 7 teachers joined the event. Due to students' mid-year exams, the Thadingyut Festival holidays, and a tropical cyclone, NCS-Myanmar was unable to celebrate the WMBD event on the planned date of October 11, 2025. Therefore, the event was rescheduled to November 5–8, 2025, which also coincided with the arrival of wintering migratory birds along nearby sandy beaches and intertidal mudflats.

Each event began with a warm welcome and introductory remarks from the NCS-Myanmar team, followed by fun icebreaking activities to encourage participation. Attendees were invited to share what birds they observe in their surroundings. Students enthusiastically talked about the birds they know, describing their colours, songs, and behaviours. The next key session introduced the history and purpose of the World Migratory Bird Day (WMBD), explaining why it is celebrated globally and highlighting the 2025 theme: **“Shared Spaces: Creating Bird-friendly Cities and Communities.”** Since these villages had never celebrated WMBD before, the team highlighted the journeys of migratory shorebirds, the importance of flyway network sites, threats faced by migratory birds and the role of wetland conservation, including Ramsar sites and the ecological value of shorelines and intertidal mudflats in the local area that serve as vital habitats for these birds. The team also explained the nine major migration flyways around the world, focusing on the East Asian–Australasian Flyway (EAAF) which passes through Myanmar. Participants also learned how to build bird-friendly communities through the **7 Calls to Action**, emphasizing coexistence, legal protection, and sustainable practices. Pamphlets about the Spoon-billed Sandpiper (SBS) and its flyway sites were distributed to deepen understanding.

A lively quiz session was held for students, followed by a Q&A while teachers checked answers the Burmese version of the WMBD song was introduced, along with video



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presentations on Myanmar’s Flyway Network Sites and conservation efforts and a vinyl photo exhibition showcased migratory birds and their IUCN status. Students who answered correctly received certificates, small gifts, and WMBD 2025 themed T-shirts.

Each event ended happily with a student volunteer singing section, group photos, snacks, and small gifts, creating a joyful and engaging atmosphere for all.

1.7 Outcome - What is the outcome from your event?

The 2025 World Migratory Bird Day (WMBD) celebrations organized by the Nature Conservation Society–Myanmar (NCS) were successfully conducted across six villages in Kun Chan Kone Township, Yangon Region, and Daedaye Township, Ayeyarwady Region, with support from the East Asian–Australasian Flyway Partnership (EAAFP). A total of 580 students and 25 teachers participated in the four-day program held from November 5-8, 2025.

The events effectively enhanced awareness of migratory bird conservation, particularly among school communities that had never celebrated WMBD before. Students and teachers gained knowledge about the importance of wetlands, flyway network sites, and the ecological role of shorelines and intertidal mudflats. The event also introduced the 2025 WMBD theme, **“Shared Spaces: Creating Bird-friendly Cities and Communities,”** and promoted the **7 Calls to Action** for building bird-friendly environments. Educational materials, including pamphlets on the Spoon-billed Sandpiper and flyway sites, were distributed and a vinyl photo exhibition showcased migratory birds and their IUCN status. Interactive activities such as quizzes, songs, and video presentations encouraged active participation. Overall, the event strengthened and inspired youths long-term support and engagement for wetland and migratory bird conservation in coastal Myanmar.






